SUBJECT: Authorization to accept a \$4,287 matching grant from the Virginia Dept. of Historic Resources' CLG Program to prepare a National Register nomination for a proposed Dominion Hill Historic District.

C. M. RECOMMENDATION:

1. Accept a \$4,287 matching grant from the Virginia Department of Historic Resources' (VDHR) Certified Local Government (CLG) Program to research and prepare a nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for a proposed Dominion Hills Historic District listing.
2. Authorize the County Manager to sign the attached VDHR Certified Local Government (CLG) Grant Agreement (Attachment A).

ISSUES: County Board approval is needed to accept a VA Dept. of Historic Resources' CLG Program grant that would require \$4,287 of County funds to leverage matching State grant funds to pay for research and prepare a National Register nomination for a proposed Dominion Hills Historic District listing. No issues have been identified.

SUMMARY: The proposed grant will be used to pay for a consultant to conduct the necessary research and to complete the nomination forms for a proposed Dominion Hills Historic District listing in the Virginia Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places.

VDHR has awarded the County a \$4,287 Certified Local Government Grant. Arlington County is to match this grant with \$4,287 of County funds. The County match for this grant can be found in the FY 2011 budget. The FY2011 budget does not include this awarded CLG grant.

BACKGROUND: For the past eleven years, the County's Historic Preservation Program (HPP) has applied for the CLG grants offered by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources.

This year the Historic Preservation Program submitted a grant request to VDHR to research and prepare a nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for a proposed Dominion Hills Historic District listing. The Historic Preservation Program, from its analysis of data from the recently completed Countywide Historic Resources Survey, believes that the Dominion Hills neighborhood is eligible for inclusion and listing in both the Virginia Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places.

The Virginia Department of Historic Resources, in awarding its grants for this CLG Grant program cycle, has decided to fund this grant request from the Historic Preservation Program of Arlington County. The \$8,574 amount for this proposed work will be divided equally between the County and VDHR, with each providing \$4,287.

The Historic Preservation Program has in its current budget the full \$8,574 for the proposed work; with the grant, only half of that amount will be needed from County funds. The attached proposed agreement, once signed, is the County's acceptance of the matching CLG Grant with VDHR. County staff recommends that the County execute this agreement.

DISCUSSION: Because of the State CLG Program grant deadlines, the County staff submitted the grant application prior to County Board consideration, and contingent on County Board approval. The grant award from VDHR is for \$4,287. Together with matching County funds of \$4,287, these funds would be used to hire a consultant to research and complete the necessary nomination forms to list the Dominion Hills Historic District in both the Virginia Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places.

It should be noted that listing in the National Register of Historic Places, as well as in the Virginia Landmarks Register, is solely honorific and does not require a property owner to receive any government permission to buy, sell, lease, alter, add, or demolish their property. The Executive Board of the Dominion Hills Civic Association has already given its approval for this project.

FISCAL IMPACT: The recommended consultant work is estimated to cost \$8,574 of which the County will provide \$4,287. All funds are already appropriated in the FY 2011 budget.

CONCLUSION: It is recommended that the County Board accept the \$4,287 match CLG Program Grant from VDHR to research and prepare a nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for a proposed Dominion Hills Historic District listing and authorize the County Manager to sign the agreement document (Attachment A) accepting this \$4,287 matching VDHR Certified Local Government (CLG) Program grant.

The attached CLG Agreement (Attachment A) incorporates two documents (which are somewhat overlapping) in addition to the CLG Agreement itself. These documents are: 1) The "DHR Request for applications," (see number (2) on agreement form) which includes the basic CLG guidelines which outline what types of projects would be eligible for a CLG grant; grant conditions; application requirements; reimbursement guidelines; evaluation and award criteria; and general terms and conditions (these general materials are not attached to this report); as well

as a form that when signed, becomes the Grant Application; and 2) the Grant Application (see number (3) on agreement form) submitted by Arlington County, which is the signed "Request for Application" and includes specifics as to the grant administration. This signed Request for Application is attached hereto as Attachment B.



Project Time Schedule

The estimated time to successfully complete this proposed National Register Historic District nomination for the Dominion Hills neighborhood in Arlington County is twelve (12) months. The proposed project will begin on July 1, 2010 and will conclude June 30, 2011. The proposed project is broken into four (4) sections.

The entire neighborhood has already been surveyed to 1948 in the Arlington County Countywide Historic Resource Survey, and a PIF for the Dominion Hills neighborhood is just being completed as part of the Arlington County FY2009-10 CLG Program Grant. It is therefore proposed that the first three (3) months of the grant project be used to survey the Dominion Hill neighborhood to a 1960 date and to conduct the necessary search for information that will be needed to complete Section 8: Statement of Significance of the National Register nomination.

The next 6 months will be in completing the National Register nomination form to the approved standards of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources (VDHR) and the National Register of Historic Places. The last three (3) months of the project will involve the review and any rewrite of the proposed National Register nomination based on comments from the VDHR staff, and the placement of the proposed nomination on the agenda of the State Review Boards.

As with past proposed National Register projects from Arlington County, the County's Historic Preservation Program (HPP) staff will discuss this proposed project with the affected civic association (Dominion Hills Civic Association) before any work begins to explain the National Register process, solicit information they may have about their house and neighborhood, the advantages and disadvantages of being listed in the National Register, and to seek their support for the proposed project. The HPP staff has already conducted one such meeting prior to the work on the PIF and received a letter of support from the Dominion Hills Civic Association for that endeavor. Nonetheless, the HPP staff will yet again meet with the civic association before work begins on this project and again after the National Register nomination has been drafted to explain the results of the research, to provide information on the history of this neighborhood, to indicate which properties contribute to the proposed historic district and to continue receiving their support for this project. A public presentation will then be held at the conclusion of the nomination application to educate all Arlington residents, County officials, and members of the Dominion Hills Civic Association of the proposed Dominion Hills Historic District nomination to the National Register of Historic Places.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Project Description: This proposed CLG Grant application is to complete a National Register nomination for a proposed historic district of the Dominion Hills neighborhood in Arlington County, VA. The Historic Preservation Program staff, in consultation with their countywide survey consultants (EHF TRACERIES, Inc.) and through discussions with the Northern Virginia Regional Office of the VDHR, has identified a possible National Register historic district in the Dominion Hills neighborhood. The recently completed PIF has confirmed this assessment, develop a statement of significance for the proposed historic district and establish the boundaries for such a proposed historic district.

The completed PIF for the proposed Dominion Hills Historic District was undertaken by EHT TRACERIES, Inc. TRACERIES have been the sole source contractor for the Arlington County Countywide Historic Resources Survey and for the majority of the National Register nomination applications that have been sponsored by Arlington County since 2000. There is no consultant firm around that has TRACERIES knowledge and understanding of the historical and architectural development of Arlington County. They have also provided Arlington County with very reasonable fees. For these reasons, Arlington County has selected TRACERIES to perform this work.

After consultation with the Virginia Department of Historic Resources on the outcome of the PIF, Arlington County is ready to pursue a National Register nomination for the Dominion Hills Neighborhood Historic District. The proposed survey and preparation of a National Register nomination application for the Dominion Hills neighborhood will be completed to the approved standards of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources and the National Register of Historic Places. The proposed work will include:

- Review and Update (as necessary) of previous survey and documentation, including but not limited to the DSS survey data, and the Civic Association Neighborhood Conservation Plan, for 429 properties that were previously recorded by EHT Traceries as part of the Phase X and Phase IX survey;
- Identification and completion of documentation for approximately 169 properties that have not yet been recorded to the reconnaissance level;
- Recordation of VDHR identification numbers for all surveyed properties on County Base Maps. Photocopies of sections of County base map highlighting individual property locations will be part of each property survey file;
- Entry of on-site and archival documentation using VDHR Data Sharing System (DSS) for approximately 450 properties, including primary and secondary resources;
- Generation of two sets of hard-copy survey forms from the DSS database (one set on archival paper);

- Preparation of two sets of labeled black-and-white photographs and site-plan sketches to equal or exceed VDHR standards;
- Presentation of a public meeting during the first stage of the survey effort to include interested County officials, citizens, and members of the Civic Associations to discuss survey goals and strategies and generally inform the residents of the nomination process; and
- Production of two sets of all survey products for concurrent submission.

At the conclusion of these tasks, a National Register nomination application for the proposed Old Dominion Historic District will be prepared. This work will include completing the technical questions on the form, preparing architectural (Section 7) and historical narratives (Section 8), and including appropriate maps and 5x7 black-and-white photographs, color slides, and digital images. An inventory of all surveyed properties within the historic districts will be included at the conclusion of Section 7. The inventory prepared for Arlington County will include a brief description of each primary resource. A draft of the nomination will be submitted to Arlington County and the appropriate staff of VDHR for review. In addition, a list of all property owners and mailing addresses of owners of record for residents within the proposed historic district, as well as all property owners adjacent to the historic district, will be prepared by the County and submitted to VDHR along with the nominations. Two sets of all National Register-related products for concurrent submission to Arlington County and VDHR will be prepared.

Concurrent with the proposed National Register nomination, the Historic Preservation Program will discuss this proposed project with the Dominion Hills Civic Association before any work begins to explain the National Register process, solicit information they may have about their house and neighborhood, the advantages and disadvantages of being listed in the National Register, and to seek their support of the proposed project. The Historic Preservation Program staff will again meet with the Dominion Hills Civic Association after the National Register nomination has been drafted to explain the results of the research, to provide information on the history of this neighborhood, to indicate which properties contribute to the historic district and to continue receiving their support for this project. A public presentation will then be held at the conclusion of the nomination application to educate all Arlington residents, County officials, and members of the Old Dominion Citizens Association of the proposed National Register nomination.

Project Boundaries and Number of Resources Within Boundaries: The Dominion Hills neighborhood is a predominantly residential section of North Arlington. It is bordered on the north by Interstate 66, on the east by North Larrimore Street, on the south by Wilson Blvd., and on the west by McKinley Road. There are approximately 429 properties in the Dominion Hills neighborhood, including primary and secondary resources.

Prior Evaluation of Eligibility and/or Survey Conducted by VDHR: For the past eleven (11) years, Arlington County has been systematically and professionally conducting a Countywide Historic Resources Survey that, on average, has identified, documented and

photographed every building in the county that was built from 1950 or older. At the conclusion of each survey year, starting in 2000, the Arlington County Historic Preservation Program (HPP) staff has reviewed and analyzed the survey findings and has pursued an aggressive program of proposing and nominating National Register sites and historic districts based on the Countywide Historic Resources Survey results. This proposed grant application is part of that on-going tradition.

The Dominion Hills neighborhood was part of the Arlington County Countywide Historic Resources Survey, Year 10. The neighborhood data has been reviewed and analyzed by the Historic Preservation Program staff as well as conducting a reconnaissance survey with Laura Trieschmann, lead architectural historian surveyor for TRACERIES, the sole survey contractor for all eleven years of the Countywide Historic Resources Survey. The Dominion Civic Association has been informed the completed PIF and proposed National Register nomination. The Dominion Hills neighborhood is aware of the growing National Register listings of Arlington neighborhoods and of the many properties that have been able to take advantage of the State tax credits for rehabilitating historic houses.

NARRATIVE STATEMENT OF PROJECT DESIGN

Project Need: For the past eleven (11) years Arlington County has been engaged in a systematic and thorough Countywide Historic Resources Survey. At the conclusion of this multi-year project some 10,000 plus buildings would have been identified, documented and photographed. The question raised at this juncture is so what? Just to have taken the time to identify all of these historic resources and do nothing with the data, save for having a large file base, begs the question of why have we done it at all.

To Arlington County and its Historic Preservation Program, this survey information on historic buildings is a data base to be used to celebrate Arlington history and begin to educate citizens and visitors alike about the architectural history and diversity that exists in Arlington County. The Historic Preservation Program has pursued nominating eligible buildings – individually and with historic districts – to the National Register. Since 2000 the HPP has nominated and had listed some 26 buildings and historic districts to the National Register. This proposed nomination, the Dominion Hills Historic District, is part of the HPP's plan to raise the historic sensibility and knowledge of Arlington of its citizens and government.

The Historic Preservation Program staff is in constant communication with the Northern Regional Preservation Office of VDHR. David Edwards, Director of the Northern Regional Preservation Office, is always invited to visit and tour all of the proposed historic districts and individual buildings that are considered eligible to the National Register, as well as to discuss, both in the field and in the office, the merits and significance of these proposed National Register sites. David Edwards has always accepted these invitations, and his input has made Arlington County's National Register nominations a stronger application.

Current Threats: The current housing crisis in America has not overly affected the Arlington County real estate market. Arlington's proximity to Washington DC – with its steady Federal employment, and growth in the non-profit research sector, the lobbyist sector, in defense and Homeland Security related jobs, and in the general retail market – has served as a major counterbalance to the ills of the housing market. Not only are homes still being bought and sold, but the trend to buy the simple reasonable-sized traditional and historic Arlington house and raze it in order to build a MacMansion, while slowed, has not stopped. But having Arlington neighborhoods nominated and listed in the National Register of Historic Places has acted to slow down this trend. As property owners begin to recognize that their homes are considered historic, are listed in the National Register, and that there are tax credits allowable for the renovation of these buildings – as long as one follows the guidance of the VDHR Office of Preservation Incentives staff – the desire to sell and move becomes altered to stay and renovate. The Dominion Hills neighborhood, like all of Arlington neighborhoods, is served by good

schools, has a neighborhood feel, close to every sort of amenity one could ask for – shopping, cultural venues, good government, etc. Pursuing this proposed National Register nomination will increase the civic pride the residents in this area have, and work to preserve the historic content and context of Dominion Hills.

Local Benefits Derived from this Project: National Register nominations of historic resources in Arlington have contributed to the awareness and understanding of the historic significance of Arlington's early- to mid-20th century neighborhoods and development. Presently 23 Arlington County neighborhoods are celebrated through being listed in the National Register. The information researched and included in these National Register nomination applications is also used for other County initiatives: promoting heritage tourism, preserving neighborhood density and character by incorporating the neighborhood histories into the County's neighborhood Conservation Plans, educating Arlington residents about the history of their community, identifying components to incorporate in new development within older neighborhoods, and encouraging the appropriate enhancement and redevelopment of neighborhood commercial areas.

Time Frame Track Record: Over the past eleven years Arlington County has received almost yearly grants – CLG and Cost Share – for Survey, National Register and PIF's, and has produced results in the time frame of each and every grant. There is no reason to believe that this proposed project, similar to many past projects, will not be handled, managed, and executed in the same way...on time.

GRANTS MANAGEMENT EXPERIENCE AND ADMINISTRATIVE CAPACITY

Grants Management Experience: This grant would be managed by the Historic Preservation Program Coordinator in Arlington County's Department of Community Planning, Housing and Development through their Neighborhood Services Division. Attached is the resume for Michael S. Leventhal, the Historic Preservation Coordinator, who will be responsible for managing the grant. Prior to working for Arlington County, Michael Leventhal had been the Executive Director of the Utah Heritage Foundation, as well as the Executive Director of the Mobile (AL) Historic Development Commission and the Special Projects Coordinator at the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Throughout his thirty six (36) years in the historic preservation field, he has administered numerous grants from Federal, State, Local, and private sources.

Selection of a Preservation Consultant: Arlington County has used the firm of TRACERIES for all of its previous Countywide surveys as well as numerous National Register nominations. TRACERIES is a listed professional preservation consultant firm with VDHR and meets the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards. TRACERIES will be chosen through a sole source procurement process. Other than meeting the Secretary's Standards, TRACERIES has the most experience with Arlington County in conducting historic resources surveys and completing National Register nominations.
